THIS YEAR the ACT Library Service and the ACT Branch of ALIA, with sponsorship from the Canberra Blind Society, the Canberra Rex Hotel and Collins Booksellers Woden, really showed everybody what celebrating Australian Library Week is all about. Due to the ACT/NSW long weekend it had to be a short week—Tuesday 6 October to Friday 9 October. Thanks to careful planning and publicity, attendance at each event was excellent and all the entertainment went off well.

The grand opening

The Week was launched on Tuesday by the ACT Minister for Urban Services, Mr Terry Connolly, at Tuggeranong Town Centre Library. He began proceedings with a speech filled with his support for libraries, then cut a 'Book magic' cake. The occasion also launched the use of plastic bags sponsored by the Canberra Blind Society. Enthusiastic members of the Kambah High School Band provided a musical accompaniment. Fifty people attended, as well as WIN TV and representatives from several newspapers.

Book magic breakfast

In one of the highlights of the week, well known Australian author, Frank Hardy (*Power without glory*) kept an audience of sixty-five people spellbound over Wednesday's breakfast at the Canberra Rex Hotel. His comments about the role of libraries in the community revealed his own close personal links with libraries. After breakfast, Mr Hardy happily chatted and autographed copies of his books. He toured some branches of the ACT Library Service



and talked to borrowers and staff. His energy and genuine interest in everything and everyone was truly remarkable and most appreciated.
