tralian School Library Association, ASLA, has recently issued a report that gives some solid facts from which we can argue. It contains the results of a survey held in 1991, with the support of ALIA and AC-LIS, aimed at developing national standards. The survey covered a sample of about 1000 schools and attracted an enviable 75% response. The report, A Select Survey of School Library Resource Centres in Australia, is co-published by ASLA and the ALIA School Library Section and is available from the Executive Officer, ASLA, PO Box 450 Belconnen ACT 2614 at \$10 + \$2 p&p.

For some time past the Department of Finance has been hosting an Information Exchange Steering Committee whose Electronic Data Management Sub-committee is led by our colleague Brenda McConchie.
