Various library and related organisations provided 13 stalls/displays and there was continuous program of entertainment throughout the morning to keep the public entertained. The entertainment included a Pied Piper procession for children who were led to different venues for a craft activity, Aboriginal storytelling and to watch a group of clowns/acrobats.

As in previous years, Darwin's book-hungry public turned out in droves and helped raise a tidy sum to go back into the central book fund.
