NT Library Technicians group

he NT Library Technician Group has been active during 1992 with a supportive committee and regular attendance at general meetings throughout the year. We are, however, a small group and we have tried to encourage more people to participate at our meetings. Our efforts to promote the group and discuss the history, roles and aims of ALIA with talks to classes have been disappointing because attendance and involvement in the group has not increased.

Bev Davis is currently working on the history of the Library Practice course as 1992 was the 10th anniversary. Graduation night in 1992 at the NT University recognised the seven new graduates of the Associate Diploma of Arts (Library Practice) with Robyn Cavenagh acknowledged as the outstanding graduate for 1991.

The Course Advisory Committee, with the involvement of Library Technicians, had produced a draft for re-accreditation of the Library Practice course, which has now been approved. Among the changes were additional electives and an increase in the compu-

ter applications area to all units. Cataloguing now relates more to computer record structure and retrieval in libraries.

We have compiled a database of Library Technicians, Trainees and Library Assistants in the Northern Territory, which has proved useful for contacting people in remote areas.

We are concerned about employment for qualified Library Technicians in schools, who are currently being paid the same salary as School Assistants who have had no tertiary training. Librarians prefer to have qualified Library Technicians in their libraries. We have expressed our disapproval of this situation to the union and to ALIA. Unfortunately our membership numbers for PSU Union and ALIA are low in the Northern Territory and we are concerned that nothing may be done about the discrepancies in salaries.


