NLA preparing 'Easy Reading' guide

What to include? Your suggestions needed

√he National Library of Australia has commissioned the Adult Literacy and Basic Education (ALBE) Resources Unit in Tasmania to produce a guide to books and audio tapes suitable for adult new readers. The guide, in the form of a select annotated bibliography, will help librarians and other providers to establish core collections of easy reading for adults with reading difficulties. The bibliography, which will be published in 1995, has been supported financially by the National Library, the Department of Human Services and Health, and the State Library of South Australia.

The material selected will be broad enough to offer a choice of easy reading for adult new readers from all sorts of backgrounds, including people of non-English speaking origin, people with intellectual disabilities, adult literacy students, Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander people.

The National Library and the ALBE Resources Unit are eager to hear from librarians, literacy professionals, booksellers, publishers and readers who can recommend titles (both print and audio) for inclusion in the bibliography.


For a book to be eligible for inclusion, it must offer an entertaining, relevant and satisfying reading experience, and must be 'easy to read'. This means it must be short and simple, without being simplistic, patronising or dull. It must also be clearly written and designed for maximum readability.

As well as being easy to read, titles should loosely fit the description of 'reading for pleasure'. Titles may belong to categories such as fiction, humour, travel, biography, adventure, or poetry; and should be topical and engaging.
