

Sending nitrate films back home

The National Film and Sound Archive is repatriating some of its fragile stock

The NFSA is repatriating over three thousand reels of foreign nitrate film material to selected film archives in America, Canada, France and England, the countries of origin. In order to streamline its own very large collection.

This first batch includes early English newsreels and the famous *The Astronomer's Dream* made in 1989 by pioneer French filmmaker, Georges Melies. Copies of the most significant material have been retained for

research and screening purposes.

The decision to deselect this material from the Archive's collection was not taken lightly. The NFSA does not have the resources to take proper care of this material, either storing or preserving it. The priority is to look after Australian material first.

All of the material is on unstable nitrate film stock, so that it will continue to deteriorate if not given proper preservation attention. The Archive fears that if it

were to keep these films it would probably be more than 20 years before they were considered for restoration or copying, and that it would be irresponsible to hold onto these films for that amount of time.

The response to this initiative has been very positive. Many overseas archives hope to discover some hidden gems in the collections and the practice of nitrate repatriation is consistent with international conventions among major film archives. ■
