Mickie Voges, director of Illinois Institute of Technology and professor of Law, Chicago-Kent College of Law has just confirmed her attendance. Mickie is the director of the first electronic library (started in 1991) and will explore how to manage an information service in an electronic environment.

Her comments on the imaging system — a major part of the information service — will be very interesting at a time when imaging is an issue in Australia.

Chris Nailer, director of *The Economist* Intelligence Unit, is the plenary speaker for the management theme. Those of you who heard Chris at the Asian business information conference will be keen to catch this inspirational and visionary speaker once more. Other international speakers are confirming their participation as we go to press.

Darling Harbour is an exciting and spacious venue. it has many luxury shops, restaurants and interesting tourist features. The venue's central location will enhance the social program and facilitate networking.

The conference dinner will be held at the AJC Racecourse, Health dinner at the Maritime Museum, and the Law

dinner at Parliament House. It is envisaged that the conference will be actionpacked with post-conference tours, seminars and meetings.
