Kerry ran on a eam ticket which included memers of the local ratepayers association, of which she was president. Cerry's portfolio responsibilities for he team ticket were libraries and he environment.

Kerry arrived in Perth in 1970. he says she has always 'lurked' in he local community, being inolved in sporting committees and he like when her boys were ounger. When the restructure of he old City of Perth came into efect in October 1993, she realised hat there was a lot at stake as her ommunity was well endowed with atural beauty and community asets. She became involved in the lo-

cal ratepayers association where she was elected to the post of Secretary, and in 1994, to the post of President.

In the lead up to the municipal election there were all the trappings of a serious campaign. Leaflets were arranged and letterbox drops were undertaken. Phones ran hot. Kerry whole week spent doorknocking. The team even had a fund raiser to help with costs. Kerry says that the campaign 'got a bit murky at times' and although no mud was intentionally slung at her, the team did suffer a bit. Such is the gentle art of politics.

Why did she do it? Kerry has found in her experience with negotiating with an extensive set of government and other bodies that the ethos our profession practices has enlightened many. Librarianship is a collaborative profession which is intimately bound to the community interests it serves. Kerry points to the thrust ALIA is making into
