Saturday will focus on networks and emerging opportunities for library service and the community — Veronica Lunn will explain the Hunter Community Information Network, and Vanessa Little will talk about the Public Libraries Automated Information Network. EdNA, community information and national networks will also be covered.

play in distance education. Presenters include Di Booker from TAFE and Open Learning; Anthea Thomas of the University of South Australia; Ian McBain from the Flinders University and Virginia Hill from the South East College of TAFE.

The social side of the conference is not to be forgotten, with a reception on the Friday evening, followed by an informal meal at a local homestead. On Saturday afternoon we will visit Penola to view the Penola School Community Library, sample the school red, and then on to the famous Coonawarra wine district for some wine tasting! The conference dinner will be held at the award-winning Bompas, a renovated early 19th century hotel, at coastal Beachport on Saturday night. Veronica will be the dinner speaker, recounting the highlights of her trip.
