Indexers medal

The Australian society of indexers is offering its annual medal for the most outstanding index to a book or periodical compiled in Australia or New Zealand.

To be eligible for the award, the index must be in print and must have been first published after 1992. It must have been compiled in Australia or New Zealand although the text to which it refers may have originated elsewhere.

Indexes are judged at the level of outstanding professional achievement, thus sufficient material is required, both in quality and quantity, for appraisal. The index should be substantial in size, the subject matter should be complex, and the language, form and structure of the index should demonstrate the indexer's expertise, as well as serving the needs of the text and the reader.

Mentoring A Victorian initiative

mentoring scheme initiated by the Victorian Branch of ALIA has achieved great success and will hopefully expand interstate. The goals of the scheme included providing newcomers to the profession with guidance and advice on professional issues and fostering their overall professional development. At another level, a primary aim was to enhance the image of ALIA as a professional organisation and to encourage new and ongoing membership of the Association.

Since the scheme began, over sixty mentees have been matched with mentors and after its first year of operation a survey of participants indicated that the scheme had been an incentive to join ALIA and to maintain membership. Furthermore the scheme had proved itself to be useful in contributing to the professional development of those undertaking library studies and of recently qualified librarians. Mentors also recorded personal benefits from sharing their knowledge and experience with other librarians and librarianship students.

The survey has provided feedback which will assist in the ongoing management and evaluation of the scheme. The desirability of running workshops explaining how the mentoring partnership works was highlighted. Many participants attended a recent workshop which was organised by the mentoring working party and which aimed at developing mentoring skills.

Mentoring is used by some of Australia's most successful companies and has a tremendous potential to offer in both personal and professional development. ALIA has agreed to fund the scheme in Victoria for the remainder of 1995 and 1996 and members of the working party are keen to assist ALIA Divisions with the project's expansion and development.
