AISS Queensland is continuing its 1995 program of scintillating activities. On 23 August, we hosted a talk by Mal Bryce of Ipswich City Council, about their ground-breaking Global Info-links project.

Global info-links electronically links the city's households, businesses, schools, and community organisations to the

The Ipswich city library is now an integrated mobile, traditional and electronic library. People go to the library to get their subscriptions and information about the project.

The rationale of the \$15 million project is to help with the economic turnaround of the city and region, by providing an information rich community. The project has also created spin-off businesses

IT is leading development in many areas of the world, and first class information systems are now necessary for the production of economic wealth.

In Ipswich, 65 per cent of homes with dependent offspring have a PC. This, coupled with the dramatic emergence of the internet, illustrates the demand.

Mal emphasised that communities must be proactive, that we simply must spend large amounts of money getting the technological infrastructure right, just as we have had to spend money setting up the traditional infrastructure of roads. Nobody is going to do it for us — nobody is going to produce the infrastructure for rural and remote communities.

A seniors' internet group is active in Ipswich. Schools in the area have each been given a free modem (although not all of them have taken it up).

Ipswich council believes it is ensuring universal access to networked information at a reasonable cost.
