Survey on culture and recreation funding

¶he Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) proposes to compile data on culture and recreation funding from the Commonwealth, State and Local Governments across Australia. In September the ABS surveyed, by nail questionnaire, approximately 200 local government councils to obtain estimates on local governnent funding, whilst funding rom the State and Commonvealth Governments was obtained hrough a combination of a direct approach to relevant agencies and by accessing budget papers.

The information sought will nvolve the total amount spent by touncils and departments on the unding of culture and recreation organisations such as libraries, mueums and those involved in music ind the performing arts. The clasifications to be used are defined by the culture/leisure statistics ramework developed under the suspices of the Cultural Ministers, Council. The data relates to fundng during the 1994-95 financial rear

The collection of data is being conducted on behalf of the Statisical Advisory Group to the Culural Ministers Council and the statistical Working Group to the sport and Recreation Ministers Council. The results of the survey vill be used to examine the level of unding across the various sectors of the culture and recreation inlustries by the three levels of govrnment. They will also monitor hanges in funding over time and assist in the planning and allocation of funding for future pro-

On the basis of previous experience with a similar survey conducted in 1993 and of recent field

testing of the questionnaire, no significant adverse reaction from providers is expected.

The ABS expects to release results from the collection by May 1996.
