Survey into student use of libraries

survey commissioned by Campbelltown City Library Service has revealed that students using their services generally do so for study-related reasons and usually found library staff to be helpful.

The survey was conducted at the four library branches in Campbelltown City and at the central library in Blacktown and looked at students undertaking primary, secondary and tertiary education, including students at TAFE colleges and University. It also considered the use of libraries on behalf of students in each of the categories.

The Blacktown library was included in the survey in order to gauge the growth in library use by students over a six-year period — Blacktown had taken part in a select survey of public library usage commissioned by the State Library in 1990, and showed increases of up to 428 per cent in the estimated number of visits per week for student groups. Overall, library use in Blacktown had increased 115 per cent, with an increase in use by students from 1127 per week to 2392 per week.

The most commonly used facilities were the photocopiers, study areas, reference collection and staff assistance. These were followed by the catalogue, CD-ROM, the local studies collection and the community information directory. Although the level of satisfaction with the facilities decreased as the educational level increased, overall, students were positive about what the library could offer them and some university students stated that they found the study areas in the libraries provided an attractive contrast to those at their university library.
