hen German library science student, Chris Gessel, was asked where she wanted to do her practicum, her answer was Australia. A second-year student at the Fachhochschule Hamburg, Chris chose the University of Wollongong for her three month study visit.

Why pick Wollongong? Chris wanted something exotic. Her previous practicums had been spent in Hamburg at the Public Library and at the African Institute. She surfed the Net and found the University of Wollongong. The similarity between the University and the Fachhochschule were sufficient to entice Chris southward.

Within days of her arrival in February, the academic year commenced and Chris was thrown into the hustle and bustle of orientation activities. Most of her time was spent working with the Reference Services team. She adjusted quickly to assisting at the Information Desk and participating in information literacy classes.

Her special project was to locate and evaluate dictionaries available on the Web for inclusion on the library web pages. Chris also had a cameo role in the library's orientation video. At her farewell, she was presented with a copy of the video as a memento and as proof that the last three months were not just a dream.

Reflecting on her stay Chris said that it

The benefit has not been one way. According to reference librarian, Lynne Wright, having Chris in the team provided opportunities to learn about librarianship in Germany and to consider service alternatives.

The library's international relations program has well-established links with university libraries in Thailand and Indonesia. It is hoped that Chris will be the beginning of contact with Germany.


