he Public Libraries and Reference and Information Services Section's joint national conference will be upon us soon (9–12 November to be exact). Our conference organisers (Intermedia) have placed an advertisement in this edition of *inCite* as a reminder to those too busy to register early (see p29 for details).

We think PUBRAISS is shaping up as one of the best library conferences in Australia in recent years and should not be missed. As well as an eclectic array of speakers, the conference features an excellent and comprehensive range of exhibitors including some of Australia's largest and most important library suppliers. At last count there were thirty-seven confirmed exhibitors.

If you are looking for a relaxing pre- or post-conference holiday, Brisbane is in close proximity to the Sunshine Coast.
