Australian winner of major international award

r Harry Bruce, senior lecturer in the Department of Information Studies, Faculty of Humanities and Social Science, University of Technology, Sydney has been awarded the 1997 American Society for Information Science's 'UMI Doctoral Dissertation Award' for his thesis entitled A user-oriented view of Internet as information infrastructure. Dr Bruce carried out his research at the School of Information Library and Archive Studies at the University of New South Wales, Associate Professor Carmel Maguire was his supervisor. This international research award was set up by the Society to recognise outstanding doctoral research.

Dissertations are evaluated based on the criteria: importance of the topic to theory development and/or practical applications in information science; soundness of methodology; organisation and clarity of the presentation; and quality of data.

Ms M Devine, the awards coordinator announced on 25 September that 'after much deliberation, the award jury has just notified us that ... the one clear winner of this year's award is Harry Bruce for his research entitled A user-oriented view of Internet as information infrastructure.'

The Doctoral Dissertation Award was first established in 1974 and has never before been won by an Australian, and is rarely won by a single researcher but often shared by two or three. Receiving the award as 'the one clear winner' draws international attention to research in information in Australia.
