
Winning librarian

Dr Janice Lyall wins the Public Service Medal

r Janice Lyall, director of the National Preservation office of the National Library of Australia, has been honoured with one of Australia's most prestigious awards, the Public Service Medal, for her work in helping to preserve Australia's and the world's documentary heritage. Dr Lyall was one of nine Commonwealth public servants to receive the medal.

The Public Service Medal, which is presented by the Governor-General, His Excellency the Honourable Sir William Deane, and awarded only twice a year, is a formal thank you for tireless work undertaken in Australia's public service.

Dr Lyall has played a key role in leading the Australian library community on

preservation issues. She was the co-author of a major report on Preserving Australia's documentary heritage, which continues to influence work being done by archive, museum and heritage working parties around the country. She has also made a contribution internationally, enhancing Austral-

ia's profile, through her involvement in work on the International Federation of Library Associations, and particularly through her work with the UNESCO Memory of the world program, which was launched in 1992 to protect and promote the world's documentary heritage.

Colin Potter wins prestigious scholarship

he James Cook bicentenary scholarship with a value of \$20 000, funded by Blackwells (Oxford) and Blackwells North America, is awarded every two years to an Australian or New Zealand librarian in middle management.

The Selection Panel [Professor Meg Cameron (Deakin University), Peter Durey (University of Auckland), Colette McCool (Health and Community Services, Cairns). Vicki Williamson (Curtin University)] decided to award the scholarship for 1996-1997 to Colin Potter, senior librarian, document supply, State Library of New South Wales. Colin is to study document delivery services and has internships in three different institutions in the United States. He has spent time at the Library of Congress where he was given an overview of the loans section, congressional research service and National Digital Library. In January he moved to Uncover Corporation in Denver Colorado and then in February went on to Carnegie Mellon University where he was involved with the work of the Information Technology Group

within the library and has studied the E-JADS, electronic journal article delivery system. As a result of his internships both he and the selectors hope that he will be able to make a useful contribution to the current discussions on electronic document delivery systems.
