# Making news around Australia

### Selected reprints from newspapers and magazines in recent months

#### Australians love libraries

The Canberra Times, 5 September 1998

Public libraries and art galleries have massive support from the Australian community. In the report, *Public attitudes to the arts,* published by the Australian Bureau of Statistics and the Australian Council, libraries were rated important by ninety-seven per cent of respondents.

### Library to put funds to good use Colac Herald, 17 August 1998

Corangamite Regional Library Corporation has recently received additional funding of \$33 000 for a multi-media and web access strategy and materials upgrade. The \$33 000 will be used to upgrade hard- and soft-ware at all corporation branches.

### Arts fear high price of culture tax Lauren Martin, Angela Bennie and Joyce Morgan, *The Sydney Morning Herald*, 14 August 1998

The price of books, CDs, movies, and 'the arts' would rise faster than inflation under the Government's GST proposals.

The GST could have a dramatic effect on libraries, according to Virginia Walsh, ALIA executive director. Ms Walsh promised a lobbying campaign backed by 10 000 members.

Under the Government's tax package, many taxes would be reduced or abolished, but few of them apply to the cultural sector. The GST would replace the wholesale sales tax, but books are currently tax-free and arts companies are largely exempt from the sales tax.

The administration of a GST is also a concern for small organisations.

### Resources sharing on the agenda

Peel District Education Office, TAFE and the City of Mandurah have been meeting to discuss ways in which the groups could share resources and save money. TAFE plans major extensions in the near future, and a new senior secondary campus is also planned.

Proposals have included the new middle school having a combined public/school library, and the senior secondary sharing their library facilities with the TAFE college.

### **Transition from school to university a 'big leap' for many students** by Amanda O'Chee, *Courier Mail*, 14 August 1998

A recent study has found that first-year university students often struggle with poor critical reading and writing, research and computer skills. Some students revealed that they did not know how to use the library properly.

Researcher Gloria Latham believes that the problem stems partly from the fact that students do not need to undertake much research in high school, but academics at universities expected them to be able to choose which information was credible and appropriate to their studies. The study recommends that universities increase workshops for first-year students to address transition problems.

### City project wins reprieve

A project to establish a complete historical database of Bendigo residents will continue. The project was begun under the work-forthe-dole scheme, but funding was cut after the project was left out of the second round of the scheme.

Co-ordinated by the Bendigo Library, the Gold'n'links project has been expanded, and will now employ seventy-nine young people who will enter data records and conserve the library's 30 000 historical photographs of the region.

## Libraries will be hit hard by GST

Northern Miner, 11 August 1998

Matt Foley, Queensland Arts minister attacked the Government's proposed GST, claiming that it would damage writing, lending library services and the whole Queensland arts industry. He suggests that the proposed new tax system could mean the State Library of Queensland would be able to buy 80 000 fewer books each year.

He believes that the worst hit areas would be the towns like Capella, Charters Towers, Richmond and Julia Creek, Cloncurry and Mt Isa.

### Council rejects internet checks

Macay City Council plans to ditch computer software which restricts internet access at the local library. The Council believes that the software also has the effect of blocking legitimate research sites. The council is satisfied that the library staff can easily monitor what sites are being accessed at the public terminals in the library.

**GST will hurt the arts, Foley warns** by Amanda O'Chee, *Courier Mail*, 10 August 1998

Queensland Arts Minister, Matt Foley warned that the arts would be one of the hardest-hit industries under a goods and

services tax. Mr Foley cited three reports which indicated that the arts would be one of the big losers under a GST.

Internet displays anti-TV bias

The internet is a threat to television viewing, but poses few problems for newspapers according to a survey released by the Newspaper Advertising Bureau of Australia. The report suggests that two-thirds of internet users read three or more newspapers each week and forty per cent read more than seven newspapers a week.

Business development manager for the Newspaper Advertising Bureau, Russell Collier said that the statistics contradicted the idea that newspapers will be superseded by the internet as a primary source of information.

### Upgrade for Collie library

Collie Mail, 30 July 1998

The Shire of Collie Library has been allocated \$40 000 to automate the library's cataloguing system. Councillor John Moran said that the funding was essential 'The library has 1963 stamped all over it — it has got to be improved'. Some of the funding will also go towards improving staff levels and upgrading the air-conditioning in the library.

### Main Street brings benefits to library Balonne Beacon, 30 July 1998

A generous donation to the St George Li-

brary has ensured that local residents can get information on starting a business or expanding their existing operation in the area.

The Business Association donated a collection of books, videos, reports and fact sheets, including the Handbook for *Small business, Your silent partner, Marketing plus — workshop series,* plus a report from the Financial management Research Centre.

### Library approved

Cairns Sun, 29 July 1998

A drive-through library services will be a highlight of the new Cairns library. The Cairns City Council has agreed to borrow \$4 million to fund the refurbishment of council chambers and relocate the city library.

The cost are expected to be offset by the eventual sale of the current library site and by significant subsidies offered by the State Library of Queensland. Councillor Deirdre Ford said that with seventy-eight per cent of residents using local libraries it was clearly the most highly utilised public facility in Cairns. 'I'm very aware that libraries are the lifeblood of a community ... I'm really determined to see library services upgraded to the level residents deserve' she said.

### Plans unveiled for \$2m library

Plans for a new library and aged services centre at Salamander Bay are on display. Construction is due to begin in November with the library opening in January 2000.

The projects are stage one of a planned community precinct which will eventually include child, youth and aged care services, adult learning, performing arts and exhibition space, and community rooms.

The community precinct will be located next to the Salamander Shopping Centre, giving the area a strong community focus.
