## Everything you ever wanted to know about metadata

he internet has allowed many people to make their online publications available quickly and relatively easily. But there is an increasing risk that these publications will be impossible to find in an ocean of irrelevant documents. To index resources more precisely on the Web, or to arrange them in topic groups for assisted navigation, you need to add metadata.

Metadata is information about your resource. It may be applied to a diverse range of materials. For example, various research communities in Australia are reviewing one of the most well-known metadata schemas, the Dublin Core, to assess the feasibility of extending it in various subject areas such as agriculture, chemistry, engineering and information technology. The interesting outcome of these reviews is that the subject gateway implementations have been able to use the Dublin Core in its original form.

The Dublin Core metadata schema has also been reviewed by the Consortium for the Interchange of Museum Information, and found to be perfectly applicable to museum artifacts. This exercise has illustrated the ability to provide a single entry point to all the different types of resources held in library collections, not just print-based materials.

The National Library has developed an information site, called *MetaMatters*, which describes the metadata schemas available for use in Australia and how to apply them. Some of

this experience comes from last year's *MetaWeb* Project. Additional expertise has been provided by many of the agencies currently deploying metadata — libraries, archives, government agencies, and other information providers.

MetaMatters also provides useful links to Australian creators in various communities such as government, user guides, discussion lists, subject gateways and a reading list.
