Hosting the $9^{\text {th }}$ national li brary technicians conference in 1997 was a momentous achievement for the ALIA Library technicians Section (ACT group). Since then the group has continued to provide a varied program including guest speakers from the library community. Activities have included visits to All States Bindery, Australian Institute of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Studies, and NICAN. Social events such as our traditional 'Cool Ule' and Christmas dinners, brunches and lunches have provided congenial atmospheres to network within the group.

Continuing our principle to create opportunities for technicians to gain valuable experience in public speaking (often for the first time) seven library technicians have addressed the group. Jenny Wood introduced the new AIATSIS Library System; and Marion Boyd presented a report on the Annual Council on Library/Media Technicians (COLT) conference, Support staff building for the future: the blueprint, the tools, the power held in Washington DC, she also talked about networking in Canadian law libraries. A visit to NICAN provided an opportunity for Tracey Barrett to discuss what we need to do to change libraries for the benefit of disabled users and for Maxine Edmonds to demonstrate a database of information on recreation, sport, tourism and the arts for people with disabilities.

Mary Gosling and her Library Studies Information class enjoyed Carolyn Cherrett's 'Life outside libraries' presentation in which she elaborated on what can be achieved with qualifications and initiative. Lists of all graduating years, and various photographs, including the $10^{\text {th }}$ reunion (1988), proved to be highlights of the evening. Guests mingled, made comparisons, and recalled forgotten fellow students. We were pleased with the mix of guests, with all years represented - from the first graduates to those graduating the following week.

The evening was such a success that we will gather in Australian Library Week 2003 for a reunion to celebrate twenty-five years of library technician studies.

The hard work and dedication of Ursula Macdermott was rewarded when she received the ALIA Library Technician of the Year Award 1998. Ursula has also been elected to the ALIA Board of Education in 1999.
