The 1999 Victorian Premier's Literary Awards received 290 entries for the five awards, with record numbers of entries for the poetry and drama prizes. This is the fifteenth anniversary of the Awards.

Judges are drawn annually from the Victorian literary community and include authors, playrights, publishers, booksellers and academics. A shortlist of three works is selected for each award.

Des Cowley, convenor of the judging panel for The Vance Palmer Prize for Fiction said, 'there is an intriguing coincidence of theme in this year's shortlisted books: Mr Darwin's Shooter and The Sooterkin are about new frontiers and early scientific marvels, while Eucalyptus locates the scientific study of species in the modern Australian environment'.

Jack Clancy, convenor of the panel judging The Nettie Palmer Prize for Non-fiction said, 'The judges noted a large number of works in the 'migrant memoirs' and 'aboriginal experience' genres — and of the former, the Holocaust loomed large."

Margot Hillel, convenor of the judging panel for The Cross Pen Prize for Young Adult Fiction said, 'Each of the novels shortlisted explores strong ethical concerns and the notion of being different, but they are not overtly didactic'.

Richard Mudford, scriptwriter, filmmaker and convenor of the judging panel for The Louis Esson Prize for Drama said, '...the panel was drawn towards those plays that pushed at theatrical boundaries."

A record number of 58 entries were received for this year's C I Dennis Prize for Poetry. Entries ranged from minimalist lyrics and verse novels to a performance-based CD-ROM.

Winners will be announced at the Awards Presentation Dinner on Friday 15 October at the Grand Hyatt Melbourne. The Dinner will feature the celebrated Australian actor Ruth Cracknell as special guest speaker and Andrea Stretton of ABC TV's 'The Arts Show' as host.
