Recent appointments in the library sector

Pro vice-chancellor appointed at Griffith University

Janice Rickards (pictured right) is doing a good job of debunking the myth that today's librarians love books and spend most of their time reading. Janice has recently been appointed pro vice-chancellor (information services) and is looking to technology to take Griffith University — and its strategies for accessing and using information — into the next century.

She has been a librarian for more than twenty years and recalls the introduction of the first computers: 'I can remember the great potential we could see for computers once they became more widespread', she said.

In her seventh year with Griffith, Janice was delighted to be appointed to the pro vice-chancellor position. The Division of Information Services (INS) is made up of three main branches — the University's libraries, Information Technology Services and Griffith Flexible Learning Services.

New position at City of Wanneroo lan Stone has been appointed to the new position of manager, library services at the 'new' City of Wanneroo in Perth's rapidly growing northern suburbs.

In 1998 the 'old' City of Wanneroo was split into two new local governments, the City of Joondalup and the new City of Wanneroo. Ian will be responsible for the branches at Girawheen, Wanneroo, the Wanneroo Mobile, Yanchep and the new branch being established at Clarkson.
