Is this a first for ALIA?

1999 began for the Riverina Regional Group of ALIA with the election of an all-male executive: Chris Griffiths as president, Tim Eggleston as secretary, and Greg Fry as treasurer — this must surely be a first for ALIA!

In March our dinner meeting in Wagga Wagga was attended by ALIA president Craig Anderson, who spoke and answered questions at what was a lively meeting. Australian Library Week 1999 saw an informal gathering of Albury ALIA members (and others) for Friday afternoon drinks at a local watering hole, and a week later the Riverina Regional Group hosted a workshop on ergonomics, presented by a local occupational therapist. In June the group was involved in publicising the visit to Wagga Wagga of Dr Joy McGregor, who presented a workshop on information literacy, and at our June meeting guest speaker Carol Mills spoke about her research into the history of paper-making in Australia.

The latter part of this year has seen us concentrate on two major issues. Our September meeting included a discussion of issues surrounding the GST and libraries — this was primarily a consciousness-raising exercise with a view to holding a more comprehensive workshop early in 2000. We

have also held discussions on the rising cost of producing and distributing our newsletter, *Hinteralia*, and have undertaken a couple of initiatives: one is to seek funding from the New South Wales branch; the other is to consider electronic means of distribution (e-mail and/or web-page) as a means of reducing costs. The final issue of *Hinteralia* will seek feedback from members as to receiving the newsletter electronically.

At the time of reporting, ALIA Riverina Regional Group is preparing to co-host (with Friends of Wagga Wagga City Library) a function at which Professor Bob Usherwood, from the School of Information Studies, Sheffield University, United Kingdom, will speak on 'The value of public libraries and the social audit'.

The group includes members from the library communities of Albury-Wodonga, Wagga Wagga, and surrounding areas. So we continue to grapple with the problems of 'the tyranny of distance' but are still able to present a varied program, and keep members in touch with each other via our mailing list, our newsletter, and updates to our web-pages.

This year we noted with some pride the awarding of an ALIA fellowship to one of our former members, Dr Maxine Rochester. ■

The Branch's continuing professional development section recently held a successful event at which various conference papers presented recently by Western Australians were 're-run' to give those who had not at-

tended the conferences the opportunity to hear them.

ALIA Western Australian Branch has invested a great deal of time and effort in lobbying against the proposed State Government *Library, Culture and the Arts Bill*. At this stage the Bill is still in Parliament but the library community, along with other groups affected by the legislation, are striving to have this Bill defeated. Thanks go to all those who have so enthusiastically and passionately expressed their opposition to it.

Finally, looking forward to 2000, it is hoped that the Branch can continue to provide a relevant and dynamic program to Western Australian members. ■
