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## American expert visits the National Library of Australia

he National Library of Australia recently invited Laura Campbell, the director of the American National Digital Library Program to visit Australia.

Laura's busy schedule included a public lecture, discussions with the National Library staff and the National Library Council, and on Thursday 4 February, the delivery of the keynote address at the *Digital Library Forum*.

Laura's visit enabled many librarians, information technology professionals and administrators to gain an excellent understanding of the National Digital Library Program, and its 'secrets of success'.

National Digital Library Federation

The National Digital Library Federation is a group of sixteen organisations that have come together to create and support a national digital collection. Federation participants manage and operate digital libraries, including twelve university libraries, the Na-

tional Archives and Records Administration, the New York Public Library, and the Commission on Preservation and Access. The Federation supports collective action, in recognition that no one institution can store the entire nation's resources in digital form, and that a distributed approach requires co-ordination in order to ensure standards.

The Federation is concerned with:

- the discovery and retrieval of digital information;
- intellectual property rights and the identification of appropriate economic models; and,
- the archiving of digital information.

Members contribute to the Federation in many ways — they contribute the time of key individuals in their organisations, they fund activities such as travel and meetings, and provide financial support for a small staff. National Digital Library Program

The goals of the National Digital Library Program are to convert Library of Congress collections to digital form, to build a national program incorporating the collections of other institutions, and to make these collections available to the widest possible audience. Within the Library of Congress, the program aims to digitise five million items, including non-book materials such as photo-

graphs, motion pictures, and sound recordings that tell the multi-media story of America. The program involves a staff of more than fifty people, most of whom identify and prepare collections for digitisation. Much of the processing work, including scanning, is out-sourced.

In addition to creating a core of digital materials, and establishing formal collaborations with other repositories, the program includes other institutions with unique American history collections. Access to these materials will be through the internet, CD-ROM, or other delivery modes as appropriate. The program works closely with end-users, such as teachers and researchers, to ensure that the most useful collections and material are digitised.

The National Digital Library Program has successfully run a number of initiatives to increase involvement, awareness, and support of the program. For example, a national digital library competition, sponsored by Ameritech, has provided funding for community organisations to create digital collections of primary resources. As well, the program annually invites fifty educators to participate in a week-long program to investigate the National Digital Library's resources, and formulate ways in which these resources can be used in classrooms.
