Local cataloguing under threat

The Hennepin County Library (HCL) catalogue, an influential exemplar of excellence, is under threat. Crafted over many years by Sandy Berman and his dedicated team, this catalogue has been a seminal work demonstrating the idiocy of many of the Library of Congress arcane descriptors by the very practical action of replacing them with user-friendly terminology based on natural and contemporary language.

It is now mooted to cease all local cataloging at Hennepin County, give the catalogue away to OCLC and henceforth accept OCLC records unquestioningly and unedited, despite the many awards and honours, and the not inconsiderable royalties, the HCL catalogue has earned.

This is not just a local issue — it potentially impacts on every library in Australia, because the HCL catalogue was a practical example of the benefits of local cataloguing which also highlighted problems of undercataloging in other collections, and a means of advocacy to the Library of Congress which, as a result, has implemented changes which benefit us all.

It is ironic that just as libraries should be realising that local cataloguing is the only way in which web sites are going to be made accessible to library users as an extension of hardcopy resources, we are about to lose a resource that would continue to assist in making all resources more accessible.
