You can judge library by its cover Daily News Tweed Heads, 4 May

Tweed Heads library is no longer the worst in NSW after the opening of the new Tweed Heads Library. The new library is the result of a long-term plan and increased spending by the Council over the past four years. Tweed area librarian, Judy Duroux, said the library had increased three times in size as a result of its relocation and refurbishment.

Budget winners

Castlemaine Mail, 5 May

The Castlemain Library was one of the big winners after the Victorian state budget was announced. The library has been allocated \$1 million for redevelopment. The library's allocation will be spread over two financial years with building expected to begin in early 2001 after final plans have been developed and approved.

Easier access to net

Namoi Valley Independent, 11 May

Gunnedah is the first centre in northern NSW to become part of NSW.net. Tony Kelly, Country Labor MLC launched the project at Gunnedah Global Information Centre in May. NSW.net will link councils and their libraries throughout the state, and member councils will pay the same fee for their ongoing costs of staying online. The NSW Government has provided \$8 million to the project with country councils having their connection fees reduced by at least

A new chapter in library's life

An internet café and extra exhibitions space are among the plans for a \$40 million re-development of the State Library of South Australia. Floorspace will be increased by twenty-five per cent, and the number of computer terminals almost doubled.

Changes include: a new top floor and facade on North Terrace and Kintor Avenue; increased access to the Bray reference collections; a new foyer, likely to include the internet café and bookshop, and redesigned floorplan.

A \$50 000 overhaul of the library at Victoria University's St Albans campus has changed the library from one of the most hazardous places to work to one of the safest. The Victorian WorkCover Authority recognised the library's transformation by giving the university an award for the best health and safety system by a business with more than thirty

Five year strategy to sustain library services

West Wimmera Advocate, 17 May

A recently completed report is looking into ways to better utilise resources and services in the Wimmera Regional Library Corporation. The report was compiled after a number of public meetings and a telephone survey. The study suggests that with an aging and decreasing population, the region will have a lesser capacity to pay for services.

Library members strike video gold The Advertiser (Adelaide), 18 May, by Rebecca Holmes

Marion Libraries have come up with a novel way of reducing their costs and increasing benefits to library members. They have instigated a 'privilege card' system which entitles library members to a \$1 discount on video hire at four local video stores. Council coordinator of libraries said that the initiative would allow the council to redirect scarce library funds from commercial videos to educational resources.

Libraries go online Shepparton News, 19 May,

Library services across Victoria are now accessible on the internet through the Victorian Virtual Library. The site [http:// www.libraries.vic.gov.au] was launched by State and Regional Development Minister, John Brumby. More than \$640 000 has been spent to develop the Victorian Virtual Library, which provides: online searching of library catalogues; a database of reference queries; a list of recent events/hot topics; book suggestions; and a directory of free web-based e-mail facilities.

Trust funds released to Stawell Library Stawell Times — News, 19 May

The Northern Grampians Shire Council has agreed to release Trust funds held by Council on behalf of the Stawell Library. Now that the Library is run as a separate entity to the council, council believes that the trust arrangement is no longer appropriate. The library will be able to operate its own bank account for the receipt of public donations and purchase of various items.

Library seeks fees support

Wimmera Mail — Times, 24 May, by Louise Kemp

Wimmera Regional Library Corporation wants to ensure it has full council support to increase charges before seeking State government help to plan for the future. Corporation chief executive officer, Russ Elwin, said that the library wanted to arrange a delegation to Local Government Minister Bob Cameron to seek funding to employ an independent project manager to investigate how the library could best deliver services.

Australian Library Week

Australian Library Week continues to attract lots of media attention, helping to raise the profile of libraries around the country. Our news clippings service identified 145 articles in mainly regional papers. Our clippings service appears to have missed most of the articles appearing in Tasmanian and South Australian media — something which I am sure does not reflect the true success of Australian Library Week in those states.

The Queensland media continued their strong support of Australian Library Week with twenty-six articles identified. Victoria was by far the most successful with 94 items identified. The state-wide story time appears to have captured the media's imagination: it features in the majority of articles.
