If you can arrange transport, a visit to Tidbinbilla Nature Reserve will reward you with close encounters with Australian fauna.

Canberra is renowned for its worldclass education and research facilities and their related libraries and information centres. Many of these libraries are available for visits, and bookings are being taken. If you have not booked to visit a library, you are encouraged to join in. Making contact with another colleague in a similar type of library to yours can add a personal dimension to your visit to this conference.
