Website launched as part of Library and Information Week

he library staff of the Bremer Institute of TAFE celebrated Library and Information Week by launching a new library website in time for Libraries Online Day — Friday 18 May 2001.

All institute staff were invited to the website launch, which included an online demonstration on 'the big screen' followed by a morning tea. The new website was an objective of a business planning initiative undertaken by the library team in the second semester of 2000. Library staff have enjoyed attending training at the Brisbane Institute of TAFE in the Macromedia products Dreamweaver, Flash and Fireworks and have designed and created the new website using their new skills.

The site has links to the Bremer homepage, WebOpac, internet search engines, subject resources guides and information about the Bremer Library. An online competition form was developed to promote the new website to staff and students. An Online Subject Resources section was created by the faculty liaison librarians to support the flexible delivery trends in TAFE. These subject resources pages include links to relevant government and industry sites, standards and legislation and other sites of interest. Faculty staff have been invited to work with their liaison librarian to create future pages appropriate for their teaching areas.

Work will be ongoing with a further project planned to build information searching guides for subjects that link all search tools (catalogue, databases, reference collection, online journals and general materials) and pages that provide help with search strategies.
