Penguin jumper project wins award

riends of the Library, Launceston, is the Tasmanian winner of the National CommunityLink Volunteer Awards for 2001.

The National Bank Volunteer Awards recognise the outstanding performance of community organisations in significantly improving the quality of life in their particular communities, motivating and managing community volunteers, and promoting the value of volunteerism.

The award recognises the part played by Friends of the Library in a project to involve Launceston library users in knitting jumpers for Little (Fairy) Penguins (see article on p36 of the July issue of *inCite*). The initial target was to establish a stockpile of 100 jumpers. Basing the project in a popular public library with a very high level of community use and support was strategically important. The library has a very strong volunteer program.

Due to the magnificent response by volunteers from the Launceston area and throughout Australia, more than 4000 jumpers have so far been made and stockpiled, in case they are needed. Tasmania has led the way in the establishment of a national stockpile.

The project was a partnership between Launceston Library, a part of the State Library of Tasmania, with the support of its volunteer organisation, The Friends of the Library, Launceston, and the Tasmanian Conservation Trust.

Penguin jumpers are used during oil spills to help penguins that have been exposed to oil keep warm and to survive. A previous environmental crisis near Launceston (the grounding of the *Iron Baron* in 1995) meant that the Launceston community knew how important it was to stockpile material in Oil Spill Response Kits.

President of Friends of the Library, Launceston, Mrs Prue McCausland, said, 'Winning this award is wonderful recognition of the efforts of so many volunteers and also recognises the dedication and effort of all those involved at the Launceston Library in promoting and managing the project.'

Opportunities for library technicians investigated

Dunn & Wilson scholarship 2001

was thrilled to be presented with the 2001 Dunn & Wilson Scholarship at the recent library technician conference dinner in Hobart.

The award is offered every two years to an ALIA library technician for the purpose of researching a topic which will result in benefits to the library industry. It is made possible through the generous support of the Dunn & Wilson-owned bookbinding companies of LJ Cullen in Sydney and Apollo-Moon in Melbourne. Their managing directors, Malcolm Mear and John Westwood are well known and dedicated supporters of Australian library technicians.

My project is to investigate the courses of study and training opportunities for para-professional library staff in New Zealand, the United States and the United Kingdom and to compare them with what is on offer in Australia. It will culminate in a presentation of my findings at the 12th ALIA National Library Technician conference in Brisbane in 2003.

I intend to travel from July to September 2002 to visit libraries, universities, colleges and other training institutions to collect the data. I am looking forward to a busy itinerary judging by the contacts that I have already made. During my tour I would like to speak to any interested groups about ALIA and the library technician groups operating within our professional organisation. Part of my project outcome is to also encourage and develop international networks and I believe this will go hand in hand with my tour.

It would be a great thrill for me to attend the 68th IFLA Conference, which is being held in Glasgow in August 2002 as I feel this would be a perfect forum for promoting the success of educational programs for library technicians in Australia. The rest of the world needs to know what is happening here.

I am looking forward to speaking with many library technicians, assistants and aides during the next twelve to eighteen months as I gather my information.
