Award caps off big year for university librarian

n 6 November, the four individuals responsible for creating Australia's first prime ministerial library were awarded a Curtin University of Technology Vice-Chancellor's Award for Excellence. Dr Vicki Williamson (university librarian), Kandy-Jane Henderson (archivist), Lesley Carman-Brown (public programs co-ordinator) and David Wylie (archives technician) make up the John Curtin Prime Ministerial Library (JCPML) Foundation Team and have been recognised for their development of a world-class research archive whose programs advance scholarship, enhance cultural awareness and provide a gateway for the community to learn about its past.

The JCPML operates as an integral part of Curtin University of Technology's Library and Information Service and is also part of the John Curtin Centre. The team's capacity for innovation has resulted in a number of new programs and services. The JCPML has become a benchmark for other prime ministerial libraries being developed in Australia.

Perhaps the most successful innovation to date has been the conceptualisation and implementation of the JCPML Electronic Research Archive (ERA) under the leadership of Dr
