Emphasising lifelong learning, cultural diversity and information literacy

ockdale City Library, in Sydney's south, used Australian Library and Information Week 2002 as the focus of its promotion activities for 2001–2002. The library hosted a range of activities which emphasised lifelong learning, cultural diversity and information literacy.

Each lunchtime during the week professional musicians performed in the Rockdale library. The diverse range of music included a solo violinist, a troupe of musicians playing medieval music, jazz guitarist Steve Brien, traditional Chinese music and a concert harp performance.

As part of the library's commitment to lifelong learning free classes were organised. French and Chinese cooking demonstrations, and a tai chi demonstration were held through the week. These activities emphasised the library as a community place where learning of all kinds occurs.

Rockdale Library's mission is to provide the community with the knowledge it needs to fulfil its potential. To help with the development of information literacy in the community a talk on techniques for searching the web was presented. The aim of the talk was to develop a basic understanding of search techniques and the operations of the World Wide Web. The library also launched a new collection of 600 DVD titles.

Finally, the library received recognition from its major stakeholder — the City Council. The library was the recipient of a 'Mayoral Minute' at the 22 May Rockdale City Council meeting. The Mayoral Minute recognised the importance of libraries to Australian society and, in part, read:

... libraries, and everything they embody, make our cities livable cities

Libraries are very special places. They are dedicated to diversity, equity of access and continuous learning. They are well known as safe places, open to the whole community. Public libraries are unique because they are the only social spaces in our cities that are open to all people that are dedicated to knowledge.

Overall, Australian Library and Information Week 2002 was a fantastic opportunity to promote our services and mission. The library managed to create a great deal of good will in the community chiefly through the interaction of customers with our enthusiastic and professional staff. We celebrated the range of services we offer and managed to generate some local media attention.
