Recent movements in the library and information sector

he Library and Information Science Department at the School of Communication, Information and Library Studies at Rutgers University is pleased to announce that Ross Todd will oin the faculty beginning in the spring term of 2002 as Associate Professor with tenure. Professor Todd comes to Rutgers University from the University of Technology, Sydney, where he was head of the Department of Media Arts, Communication and Information. His PhD was in cognitive information utlisation of heroin by adolescent girls and his expertise is information utilisation for learning, human information behaviour, and information technology and informatics. Professor Todd is internationally recognised for his innovative work in school librarianship and information literacy.
