### Satellite events

A number of satellite events will be held both before and after the conference. These have been arranged independently of the conference. To attend these, you will need to register for them separately. ALIA National Office is taking registrations now for the following conference satellite events:

• Finding answers to clinical questions: based on the evidence gained from a

fourteen-month research project about an innovative Clinical Evidence Researcher service, the seminar focuses on the practical skills associated with the role of CML in finding answers to clinical questions, as well as some of the issues relating to the implementation of such a service in other settings.

- A fistful of dollars: copyright management workshop dealing with the changing nature of copyright laws, licences and management of intellectual property as an owner and a user.
- PDA workshop: participants will learn how to demonstrate familiarity with hand-held computers (personal digital assistants, or PDAs) and identify a range of uses for PDAs in clinical and library settings. Participants will also take away a list of sources of further information about PDAs.
- Basics of electronic indexing: this course will focus on database indexing for electronic information services and online databases and will describe various types of electronic indexing and provide practical exercises in bibliographic description, abstract writing and the use of thesauri.
- MeSH and The Health and Ageing Thesaurus: this course will focus on the use of MeSH (Medical Subject Headings) for database indexing, how to access it and how to find the right terms for medical indexing. There will be some discussion of a related thesaurus, The Health and Ageing Thesaurus, which is used in Australia for subject cataloguing and indexing health material.

The presentations cover developing a search strategy, searching the internet, using online databases, evaluating information and acknowledging sources. Library staff tailor these presentations to make them subject specific and meet student needs. The presentations illustrate theory with practical examples.

An online program 'Getting started with research' based on the National Information Literacy Guidelines will be available shortly for teachers and student to use. This product will measure attainment of information literacy skills.
