Ex Libris milestones

In one week Ex Libris Australia celebrated several milestones — the release of SFX 2.0; signing of the contract with the Australian Academic Research Library Network (AARLIN) for MetaLib and SFX; and the announcement that the British Library had awarded its contract to Ex Libris for its new fully integrated solution.

SFX, the original link server software, and MetaLib, the portal product are used by an increasing number of libraries worldwide. SFX 2.0 now has full Unicode compliance; improved administration tasks and increased flexibility for controlling user access; the Citation Linker is also enhanced with additional title search options. The E-journal Title List has an increasing coverage of variant abbreviations saving even more time and effort for serials librarians in producing reports.

SFX and MetaLib are used by more than 320 libraries including large consortia such as FinELib the national group in Finland. Unilinc are in the process of implementing MetaLib and SFX for their member libraries. The AARLIN project will integrate library resource sharing services, providing researchers throughout Australia with an overall view of the information resources available in the twenty-one collaborating libraries.

The British Library will implement the Ex Libris suite of software applications, including ALEPH, MetaLib, SFX, and DigiTool software, to support their main systems for acquisitions, cataloguing, catalogue access for both reading rooms and remote users, as well as other services.

Spydus signing

Noosa has become the sixth Queensland public library in just over twelve months to opt for the Spydus software package from Civica.

Noosa Library chose Spydus after assessing four competing products. The evaluation team sought software with a good track record of operation in Australian libraries, a package that could demonstrate the full range of automation and functionality required by library staff, and one whose development path mirrored the direction taken by libraries in Queensland.

Noosa Library anticipates greater overall automation, to relieve staff in labour-intensive areas like Home Services, where all the selections are made manually. The library expects to go live on Spydus in March 2003.

Dialog adds distance learning to graduate education program

Dialog has introduced distance learning as part of the company's Graduate Education Program (GEP).

Faculty and students in library science programs worldwide can now access distance learning modules for no cost at http://training.dialog.com/gep/distance. Online sessions cover searching basics, database indexing and advanced business searching on Dialog.

Dialog also uses the web and video conferencing for live, real-time instruction to students in remote locations.

Infotrieve acquires Ariel

Infotrieve has acquired Ariel software from RLG, a membership corporation of leading research libraries, archives and museums.

Ariel enables academic and research libraries to electronically convey and share scanned or digitised documents between and within institutions, in high-resolution TiF or PDF formats. Approximately 9400 installations around the world currently use Ariel. The software was developed and launched in 1991 by the non-profit RLG.

Dynix product development plans for 2003 Dynix has announced several key product development initiatives for 2003.

Horizon 7.3 includes many enhancements to its Acquisitions and Circulation modules as well as other key features such as closed stack access, clustered holds, duplicate borrowers, acquisitions workslips support, a new NCIP responder, and the ability to archive purchase orders and use both primary and secondary vendors.

Horizon Reports Manager 1.0 is a new reporting tool that provides a number of standard reports without requiring staff users to interpret database schema or employ specialised knowledge of SQL scripts and commands. Standard reports can be modified and saved to the database to be shared with other library staff.

Horizon Information Portal 3.0 (previously called iPac) can be used to access a wide variety of library resources in a single query. Version 3.0 will add functionality by delivering online self-registration and personalisation services, easier administration, enhanced searching, de-duplication of results from consolidated searches, a single point of authentication, selective dissemination of information and OpenURL support.

Horizon Reciprocal Borrowing: is a revolutionary new ASP service that allows 'in person' interlibrary loans across a variety of vendors' systems by means of the new NCIP standard.

Horizon Interlibrary Loan enables individual libraries and multi-vendor consortia to provide

EBSCO to acquire operations of RoweCom Worldwide

RoweCom, Inc., doing business as RoweCom,

Faxon or divine Information Services, has announced the signing of a non-binding letter of intent with EBSCO Industries, Inc., for the proposed purchase of the RoweCom worldwide subscription agent business.

What does this mean for RoweCom customers and publishers? For customers of RoweCom operations outside Europe, there are basically three situations:

- For customers who have paid RoweCom and RoweCom has forwarded this payment on to the publishers, the customer will receive journals from the publishers.
- For customers who have not paid RoweCom, the customer will receive their journals once orders are confirmed to EBSCO. Upon confirmation, EBSCO will make the appropriate payment to publishers.
- 3) For customers who have paid RoweCom and RoweCom has not forwarded this payment to the publishers, the customer will receive journals from publishers who participate in this transaction.

Gale and Amazon.com continue online sales program
