Macquarie University appoints new librarian

Macquarie University recently announced the appointment of a new university librarian. Previously deputy librarian at the university, **Maxine Brodie** took up her new appointment in February after acting in the position since the end of 2002 following the departure of former librarian Penny Carnaby.

Prior to coming to Macquarie in 2002, Brodie was director of information technology/strategy and chief information officer at the State Library of New South Wales. She spent fourteen years before this working in a range of senior library management positions at the University of Technology, Sydney.

Brodie believes that in the current age of information technology and the World Wide Web, rather than becoming less relevant, libraries have an even more important role.

Brodie has always found the Macquarie University Library fascinating. 'The Library is physically located in the centre of campus ... acknowledging that the library belonged at the heart of academic endeavour,' she says.

Her tagline for the library's role at Macquarie is 'bringing information to life'.

'This means providing a shared context, both physical and virtual, for access to information and for interaction. It means providing information resources that are relevant to the Macquarie University community and providing services that meet the information needs of that community,' Brodie says.

With plans for a major extension to the library building and a review of the library's services, she is looking forward to a challenging and exciting year.

Linda comes to the University of Tasmania from the University of South Australia where she is presently acting in the position of university librarian.

Tasmanian heads up international marine libraries network

A Tasmanian librarian has been elected president of the International Association of Aquatic and Marine Science Libraries and Information Centers [http://www.iamslic.org/] for 2003.

Denis Abbott, who has been the librarian at CSIRO Marine Research since 1984, assumed the presidency at the organisation's recent annual conference.

The appointment includes a commitment to host the organisation's 2004 conference in Hobart, an event that will also attract representatives from specialist polar institution libraries.

In addition to its annual conference the association maintains an active e-mail discussion list that is also used for exchanging surplus journal issues, reports and books. Last year, a distributed library catalogue was developed for chasing up obscure journal requests for scientists. The computer catalogues of fifty member libraries have been linked world wide for simultaneous searching to find which library has the requested item.
