ALIA Tasmania launches mentoring program

LIA Tasmania launched its inaugural mentoring program in March. The decision to establish a mentoring program was largely influenced by the re-establishment of a post-graduate library and information studies program at the University of Tasmania in 2003 after a nine-year hiatus.

ALIA Tasmania has worked hard to establish close links with the School of Information Systems, which offers the Graduate Diploma in Information Management program and is keen to build upon this successful relationship by supporting the graduates of the program as they secure their first professional appointments. The Group decided that one of the best ways of achieving this was to establish a mentoring program.

The aim is to provide a facilitated mentoring program to meet the needs of professionals at all levels, with a particular emphasis on new graduates. General guidelines are provided for both mentors and mentees. The mentoring committee negotiates formal pairings. Written agreements are established for each pairing so that both partners have a reference point for their relationship and expectations. Set timeframes operate: the

program commences in March and concludes in November; and intakes of participants are at set intervals rather than continuously. Agreements are for limited terms rather than openended. Staged events include the launch, which provides orientation and training for mentees and mentors, and a follow-up schedule. Evaluation mechanisms for both experience and progress are used. Facilitation is provided by the mentoring committee, which is responsible for organisation, negotiation, monitoring and problem-solving.

Six partnerships were negotiated for the 2004 program. One of the partnerships involves Terri (mentee) and Chris (mentor). Terri graduated in December 2003 and commenced work in the Department of Education Library and Information Centre in February this year. She has been paired with Chris, a senior librarian in the State Library of Tasmania.

By participating in the program, Terri hopes to increase her networking opportunities, tap into an experienced librarian's professional knowledge and improve her employment prospects. Terri says, 'It's going really well. We meet up for a drink after work and have a chat about once a month, or whenever I need to pick Chris's brains for a job application for example. So far, Chris has helped me with a few job applications and the interview process, an application for funding to attend the New Librarians Symposium, talked with me about library politics and culture, and is there should I need to vent some frustration after a long day'.

Chris sees her involvement in the program as an opportunity to give back to the profession and share her knowledge and experience with someone just starting out. Chris is equally keen to 'learn from a person with fresh ideas on the profession.' For Chris, this means 'being able to help a new professional, keep up-to-date with new thinking within the profession and develop an on-going professional relationship with that person to enhance both their and my networking within the profession'.
