Such a 'funny-ha-ha' description of a spiritual ritual thousands of years old, wrought from generations of people and their land, stories, songs, dances and language is politically,

socially and culturally ill-timed.

The writer is condensing an indigenous experience that has tremendous meaning to its performers to the worst kind of pun, not to mention tainting the significant meaning inherent in the gesture of providing such a ceremony for a conference (on Aboriginal land) for an audience that is predominantly non-Aboriginal.

I can only imagine the response of my mob in Aotearoa to see a 150-year-old haka put into the context of: 'a folk-dance where you can stick your tongue out at enormous Maori guys without getting thumped'.

And for those of you who think to yourselves that I should lighten up — you might want to ponder on that idiom.
