Out with the old, in with the new... the new ALIA CPD scheme, that is

Three audits in the continuing professional development (CPD) scheme have been finalised. Thank you to everyone who provided feedback on the original scheme.

When analysing this feedback and the audit papers over the triennium, it was noted that you found weighted hours and record keeping an onerous task and the withdrawal and non-compliant rate reflects this.

138 CPD scheme participants were randomly selected for audit and thirty-five per cent were found to be compliant with the scheme by accumulating the minimum of 30 points per year and 120 over the triennium. Two were excused from the audit, thirty-one per cent withdrew from the scheme for various reasons, for example, difficulty with record keeping or no longer working within the sector, and twenty-eight per cent were found to be non-compliant when they did not provide supporting documentation.

In with the new ...

The first audit in the current scheme is underway. Ten per cent of CPD scheme participants were advised in early November that they had been randomly selected for audit. It is gratifying to note our members have adapted to the new scheme, which has a simplified points and record keeping system together with a wider range of activity categories *and* that a number of members have re-joined the scheme.

There is no additional fee for personal Associate and Technician members to join the CPD scheme — it is a benefit of ALIA membership. The scheme is voluntary but when you register you are required to maintain ongoing compliance which will require the accumulation of a minimum of 30 points each year and 120 over a triennium (three years).
