orty years of news, reviews and information on Australian library services for young people came to an end in April with the final issue of *Orana: Journal of School and Children's Librarianship*.

From its origin in April 1965 as the quarterly newsletter of LAA Children's Libraries Section (CLS) in New South Wales, the publication expanded to cover the whole gamut of library and information services for young Australians. In 1970 it became the national journal for LAA CLS. Within a few years it had attracted such a high standard of articles on children's books, children's authors and library service to children in all kinds of settings that LAA School Libraries Section opted to become a joint partner.

Under the dedicated leadership of foundation editor Val Watson, *Children's Libraries Newsletter* attracted readers and high profile contributors from around

Australia. The 1977 name change to Orana: Journal of School and Children's Librarianship signalled its expanded role. Writers of the calibre of Walter McVitty, Virginia Havilland, Margaret Dunkle, Patricia Wrightson, Hugh and Maureen Crago, Barbara Ker Wilson, Maureen Nimon, Julia McRae, Christobel Mattingly and Maurice Saxby contributed significant papers. Orana (the name means 'welcome') became required reading for students and practitioners in youth library services.

Editors Martha Heeren, Carolyn Logan, Robert Sharman, David Berry, Ross Todd and Gary Gorman followed Val Watson's 23 years of dedicated service. Margaret Steinberger's appointment as editor in March 2000 heralded a change to A4 format and a more professional, polished image. At the same time, increased internet access began to signal the end of the



need for a paper-based journal. Laurel A Clyde's regular technology columns had helped ease readers into the high-tech world that is now almost second nature to their young clients. In many ways, *Orana*'s role has now been superseded by e-lists and the internet. *Orana* provided 40 years of dedicated professional education. We are proud of that achievement.
