More than 12 000 titles are accessible through EBSCO's e-journal gateway EBSCOhost Electronic Journals Service (EJS) Enhanced. Included in the online title total are more than 6 million articles. Of this figure, nearly 1.5 million articles are available via pay-per-view.

EJS handles electronic journal access and management needs. EJS Enhanced offers extensive features that help with e-journal management tasks such as: tracking the registration status of e-journals, authentication assistance to facilitate both on-campus and remote access to e-journal content, automatic management of e-journal URLs and much more. EBSCO provides durable URLs for every journal, table of contents and article in EJS Enhanced. No URL maintenance by the library is required.

## Keeping libraries safe for children

Eagerly awaited revised edition of 'A Safe Place for Children' is now available via the CILIP website (<http://www.cilip.org.uk/professionalguidance/youngpeople/safeplaceforchildren.htm>).

Libraries for children and young people are dynamic and exciting, but they must be a place where young people feel secure and confident to enjoy the resources around them, where they know that they will receive suitable help — above all, libraries must be a safe place for children.

A revised edition of the guidelines was essential in light of recent high-profile child safety cases and changes in legislation. The content reflects this, with sections on: the legal background; dealing with unsupervised children; adults in areas designated for the use of children; criminal records checks; and using photographs of children.

## ProQuest serves NewsRx to libraries

ProQuest Information and Learning has been chosen by NewsRx to be the primary online distributor of its acclaimed health periodicals for academic librarians. NewsRx is publisher of such important works as *Cancer Weekly*, *Vaccine Weekly* and *Women's Health Weekly*.

## CSA scientific and technical content added to Dialog


