## Selected reprints from newspapers and magazines in recent months

### Read all about it

*Courier Mail*, 8 January, by Belinda Weaver  
Belinda Weaver, former *inCite* columnist, reviews AllYouCanRead.com which links to a vast store of online magazines and newspapers. Almost 23 000 magazines and newspapers from more than 200 countries are linked from the site, and if you plan to use the site regularly, you can customise it so that it features only the publications that you want to look at regularly. Belinda recommends that for those looking for Australian papers and journals, the National Library of Australia's comprehensive list of newspapers at <http://www.nla.gov.au/npapers/>, or their Australian Journals Online service (<http://www.nla.gov.au/ajol/>) are better bets.

### The books of 2005

*The Australian*, 1 January, by Murray Waldren

Murray Waldren surveys what we can expect to see on bookshop and library shelves in 2005. He covers everything from Australian fiction, international fiction, non-fiction, to biography and memoirs — something for everyone!

### Word wars — no easy answer

*The Mercury*, 20 December, by Margaretta Pos

Federal Minister for Education, Science and Training, Brendan Nelson, has promised a national inquiry into literacy in 2005, which will examine how reading is taught and tested, as well as how teachers are trained. Tasmanian optometrist, Bryon Harrison, is very critical of the way children are taught to read in Australia. He is an advocate for the phonic method which teaches children to read letter by letter, syllable by syllable. Harrison is known for his research into visual attention span — VAS — in relation to literacy.

### Bagging teachers is counter-productive

*Sunday Herald Sun*, 19 December, by Matt Price

Literacy was a big issue in December 2004 after Federal Minister for Education, Science

and Training, Brendan Nelson announced a national reading inquiry. Matt Price slams the Minister for mis-representing the findings of a QUT study into teacher training and knowledge. Price argues that while Nelson has some good instincts and intentions on schools — uniform school terms and admission ages, for example — he should stop highlighting the negatives in education.

### Reading Tassie the riot act

*The Mercury*, 18 December, by Margaretta Pos

Still in Tasmania, this article looks at the fight between those educators who would like to see the teaching of phonics increased, and those who believe that the status-quo should be maintained. Brendan Nelson quoted some disturbing figures: at least one child in twenty in Tasmanian primary schools has difficulty reading.

### Top marks

*Home Hill Observer*, 16 December

An international survey of 15-year-olds from 41 countries has shown that Australia ranks fourth in reading and sixth in science. Students in the Australian Capital Territory, Western Australia and South Australia were the best performers, but students in all states and territories performed well above the international average. The survey results also indicate that the 'achievement gap' between children of high and low socio-economic backgrounds is closing.

### Google turns a new page in library project

*New York Times*, 15 December, by John Markoff and Edward Wyatt

In December 2004, Google announced an agreement with Oxford University and some of the leading American research libraries to begin converting their holdings into digital files which would be freely searchable over



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the web. The goal is to expand the web beyond its current valuable, if eclectic, body of material and create a digital card catalogue and searchable library for the world's books, scholarly papers and special collections. We will watch developments with interest!

**Library 'heavy reading' a risk**

*Daily Telegraph*, 13 December

A number of larger, quarto, books have been removed from the shelves at the Burwood Central Library amid fears that the volumes could fall from the shelves and injure patrons and staff. The books were removed under OH&S regulations after three 'minor' incidents with the cumbersome books. The books are still available, but only over the counter.

**Illiteracy landing children in hospital**

*Dpa English*, 13 December

Ken Rowe, from ACER, has discovered that for many children in the hospital system, their main complaint is that they cannot read. 'Hospital ... clinics are being filled with kids who are being referred for things like attention deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHA)', Rowe told the *Sydney Morning Herald*. 'But once the paediatricians sort out the children's literacy problems, the behaviour problems disappear.' A quarter of all children admitted to the emergency department at the Royal Children's Hospital in Melbourne, were diagnosed as having non-medical conditions like ADHD and other behavioural problems.

**A novel idea to have pictures in books**

*Kalgoorlie Miner*, 10 December

Graphic novels are now gaining acceptance as an alternative source of reading material. While some dismiss graphic novels as just comics, a high level of visual literacy is often required to 'read' the pictures as well as the text.

**Better beginnings**

*Armadale Examiner*, 9 December

As part of the State Library of Western Australia's 'Better beginnings' literacy program, eve-

ry child born in Armadale in the next twelve months will receive a free book and activity kit. The books and kits will be distributed through the Community Health Centres and Community Nurses. 'The Better Beginnings program is about setting children on the path for developing a love for books that will last a life-time' said Patricia Walker, city manager of Library and Heritage Services.

**Give the gift of reading to a kid in need**

*The Weekly Sunshine Coast*, 8 December

Maroochy Libraries organised a 'Books 4 kidz' book drive as part of their Christmas celebrations. Library patrons were encouraged to purchase a children's book, wrap it and tag it with an approximate age group and gender, and hand it in at any Maroochy Library branch. The books were then distributed to local charities in time for Christmas.

**Attack on Aussie books**

*Wollongong Advertiser*, 8 December,

The Federal Government has refused to renew a grants scheme which provided funds to schools to purchase Australian books, both fiction and non-fiction. The scheme began in 2000, after the introduction of the GST. Shellharbour Public School librarian, Margaret Cooper, said that the loss of funds would mean that she could only purchase approximately 350 books a year, not the 500 books that she could purchase with the funding.
