The best-available evidence, moderated by user needs and preferences, is applied to improve the quality of professional judgements.

The 3rd International EBL Conference will build on the ideas generated at the two previous international EBL conferences, held in Sheffield, UK (2001) and Edmonton, Canada (2003).
