In January, I was very fortunate to receive a grant to attend the ALIA Online 2009 Conference in Sydney. As a Trainee Librarian at the 'one person' East Arnhem Health Library, in Gove Hospital, Northern Territory (NT), my conference experience turned out to be a wonderful contrast to my usually quiet life. I am currently in my second semester studying Librarianship and Corporate Information Management through distance education with Curtin University.

The isolated East Arnhem Region where I live covers an area of 64 000 sq kms on the very top north-east of the NT peninsula. With a lack of sealed access roads and, therefore, minimal road transport, the majority of movement into and out of the region is by aircraft. The population of 15 935, of which 64% are Indigenous, live in 12 main communities and numerous smaller Aboriginal homelands located on the mainland and adjacent islands.



The Health Library is part of the Northern Territory Department Health and of Families (DHF) library which supports the research information and needs of all DHF staff and affiliated health professionals throughout

the NT. I supply ICT and library support to health professionals in the Gove region as well as the remote health workers living in the surrounding communities.

Nominations are now being called for the following research awards of the Australian Library and Information Association.

Australian Library and Information Association

Library Technicians Research Award [previously the Dunn & Wilson Scholarship]

The Library Technicians Research Award provides the recipient/s with an opportunity to undertake a particular project of relevance to the role of library technicians in the broad library and information profession. The award proposal can be made by an individual financial library technician member or a group of financial library technician members.

The award is a biennial award of up to \$5 000 and is open to all financial library technician members of ALIA. The award will be presented at the ALIA National Library & Information Technicians Conference in September 2009.

Ray Choate Scholarship

The Ray Choate Scholarship is a biennial award up to \$4000 which will enable the recipient to investigate a particular aspect of reference or information services that will lead to improved practice in the area. The research topic should relate to the Objects of the Association.

Applicants are required to be financial personal members of ALIA with an understanding of and experience in provision of reference services.

The University of Queensland throws open the doors of 11 of their different libraries for visits - many of them awardwinning buildings, stunning in both form and function. As well as the key libraries on the main campus at St Lucia, four health libraries co-located with Brisbane's largest hospitals are on show.

Public libraries are well covered, with visits to the newest libraries in the area.

School Librarians will not be disappointed either. Five of the large private schools in



Brisbane are inviting visitors to see their spectacular library buildings, collection and services.

If you haven't got all day to spare, there are DIY tours, and State Library of Queensland, Queensland University of Technology Libraries, and Brisbane Square Library will all offer one hour tours all day.
