IFLA 2010, Brisbane, 14-19 August 2010

The Brisbane Convention and Exhibition Centre (BCEC) will be the congress venue, an exceptional site with outstanding facilities to accommodate the large number of delegates expected to attend the IFLA 2010 Congress, to be held in

Brisbane 1–19 August 2010. It is the perfect venue for the program to take place under one roof within a ten-minute walk from the centre of Brisbane.

The Centre offers a wide range of meeting rooms, exhibition spaces, plenary halls, and event facilities including a permanent and dedicated Speakers' Presentation Centre. Here congress speakers will have access to modern IT and audio visual facilities and a private soundproof rehearsal room for finalising and rehearsing presentations.

Preparation is also underway to expand the floor space of the Brisbane Convention and Exhibition Centre further, which will enhance the site's flexibility for Congress use even more. This expansion phase will be completed prior to IFLA 2010.

The area is also a cultural precinct, with the State Library of Queensland, the Queensland Art Gallery, and the Gallery of Modern Art within easy walking distance. The multicultural West End and Fortitude Valley areas are easily accessible, and the Brisbane city centre is located across the river, offering stylish shopping and many world-class restaurants. Why not take a ride across the river on one of Brisbane's famous City Cat ferries and experience the city from the water? For those wanting to experience more of the outdoors, the state's capital is also located close to beaches and mountain ranges.

The IFLA 2010 National Committee invites you to Brisbane to participate in this annual world congress to be held 14–19 August 2010. Please plan to 'Stay an Extra Day' for library tours on Friday, 20 August 2010 as well as some sight-seeing tours before or after the congress.

Note the dates in your diary now. IFLA 2010 will be the closest congress for Australian colleagues for some years to come and this means travel costs will be kept to a minimum. The proximity of Queensland to Asia and Oceania is a bonus for colleagues located close by.

The IFLA Congress provides a great opportunity to improve and expand your skills through involvement with this professional programme.

Great fun was had by all young Warringah Library Service readers who took part in the 2008/09 Summer Reading Club.

We adapted the Get in the Game logo to mirror the local beach theme with a surfer reading a book while riding a wave. Large banners were hung at the libraries to encourage new members.

Registration began on the 1st of December and we were delighted to have 449 young readers sign up to receive their free library bag and passport and start reading over 9000 books this summer.

The library bag contained an activity book and a journal for the children to complete. The children loved their activity book and journal featuring recommended reading lists, CBC's Books of the Year list and an area for them to note the books they had read.


As the children joined, we tagged their library membership to show that they were members of the Summer Reading Club. The Access Database we compiled from this information saved branch staff a great deal of time and streamlined the process.

Library visits increased as young patrons were keen to borrow more books and pick up the gifts they received as rewards for reading. Miniature torches, sets of Russian dolls, and compasses were a great hit.

The reward for reading 20 books was a great hit. Staff simply had to take a digital photo of the child and forward to our Central Library where it was made into a coloured poster of a wet-suited surfer in action, displaying the face of the child.

There was also wonder and awe when the children and their families realised they would be off to the movies to see *Bedtime Stories*. Special badges were issued to children whose parents were not accompanying them, and there was staff on hand for supervision.

The children's book reviews on specially designed Get in the game...read! postcards were displayed in all our libraries and many of the books reviewed were borrowed as a result. The



children enjoyed seeing their contributions displayed in a public arena.

Our selectors and reader's advisory staff will make good use of this valuable information about what our young patrons like to read.

An added bonus of the Summer Reading Club was the informal networks formed between the young readers from all over Warringah as they met other readers at the gala movie event.

Staff thoroughly enjoyed the whole program as they felt a

little like Santa handing out rewards to our readers.
