

(3) ALIA's President, Tricia Genat, welcomed all the guests to the Mural Hall: 'That wide and inclusive welcome showcases the vibrancy and reach of the library sector, the wonderful cross-party support and the broad-ranging programs that are delivered in partnership to readers in every corner of Australia. Guidelines, Standards and Outcome Measures for Australian Public Libraries were launched at the event. These reflect the many services that public libraries deliver and provide a road map for the future. This third edition includes major revisions and new outcome measures, reflecting the changing public library environment.



4 Craig Laundy, Assistant Minister for Industry, Innovation and Science, (seen here chatting to author Jackie French) said that he has seen vast changes in libraries over time. 'As many [libraries] have thrown out the bookshelves, they've thrown out the shoosh, making them much more alive and dynamic places. Places like the new Woollahra Library in its purpose-built, state-of-theart premises in the Double Bay Shopping centre. It's like a super high-tech tree house, with dedicated tech and video gaming spaces, iPads and Macs, private reading burrows in walls - an exciting, ultra-modern, fun space.' He paid tribute to libraries, which provide the link to digital technology, especially for those library users who don't have a connection at home. 'The explosion of digital technologies presents both challenges and opportunities for everyone in the business of helping Australians skill up, but you don't need me to tell you that... After all, libraries have been at the coalface of growing Australia's knowledge and skills base for a very long time.'
