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READING AND RIDING THROUGH REGIONAL LIBRARIES

HELENA ZOBEC reports on how a group of librarians, who also happen to ride motorcycles, have made an annual trip around regional libraries across NSW to advocate for library services.

The first Biblio Turismo was the 2006 Springwood to Cootamundra road trip, where librarians on motorcycles visited the local library. It was organised by Gosford City Council staff to help raise community awareness about country libraries and encourage younger people to join the profession. The council's then Library Services Manager, Alan Flores, said that the three-day event was a great way to break down the stereotype of librarians.



Since then, the Biblio Turismo team has visited many libraries, in groups of between two and 20 motorcycles, covering thousands of kilometres along the way. As well as having a lot of fun with their local communities, many of these libraries have benefitted from the publicity of having the event covered by the local media to help raise their profile in their local communities.
