Close to 70 participants attended the 10th ALIA Top End Symposium, held 12–13 October at the Michael Long Learning and Leadership Centre in Darwin, Northern Territory. The theme was ‘Enabling Universal Literacies in the Digital Age’.

This theme was selected to highlight the key role that libraries play, in multiple ways, towards attaining the UN’s Sustainable Development Goals. The symposium attracted an impressive range of speakers, each of whom linked back to the theme in diverse ways, making us ponder about the significance of the message being delivered.

Professor Deb Verhoeven, Associate Dean of Engagement and Innovation at the University of Technology Sydney, spoke on ‘Dewey really need to get into this? Preparing libraries for the pluriverse to come’; while Jane Cowell, the Chief Executive Officer of Yarra Plenty Regional Library, talked about digital fluency. Roxanne Missingham, University Librarian of the Australian National University, spoke about the future dreams and dangers facing libraries; while ALIA President, Lyndall Ley, spoke on the value of literacy. The presentations were all a big hit and the symposium was a resounding success.

The 2019 ALIA Australian Library Design Awards conference will be held in March 2019 and voting is now open for the ALIA Members’ Choice Award.

These awards celebrate 15 new and refurbished libraries across Australia and include libraries such as the University of Queensland Library, Karratha Public Library and Glenelg Libraries.
