# GEORGII V REGIS.

### No. 1736.

An Act to amend the Impounding Acts, 1920 to 1925, and for other purposes.

*[Assented to, September 30th, 1926.]*

**B**E it Enacted by the Governor of the State of South Australia, with the advice and consent of the Parliament thereof, as follows:

**1.** (1) This Act may be cited as the "Impounding Act Amendment Act, 1926." Short titles.

(2) The Impounding Acts, 1920 to 1925, and this Act may be cited together as the Impounding Acts, 1920 to 1926."

(3) The Impounding Act, 1920, is hereinafter referred to as "the principal Act." No. 1441 of 1920.

**2.** Subsection (5) of section 25 of the principal Act is amended by adding at the end thereof the words "or in some newspaper circulating in the locality in which the public pound is situated". Amendment of principal Act, s. 25—  
Publication of notice of impounding.

**3.** Section 46 of the principal Act is repealed and the following section is enacted in lieu thereof:— Provision substituted for principal Act, s. 46.

46. (1) If any cattle are found straying, or at large, or tethered, or depastured, in any street or public place, the owner thereof shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Two Pounds. Liability of owner of straying cattle.

(2) In any proceedings for an offence against this section the allegation in the complaint that any person is the owner of the cattle in respect of which the complaint is made shall be deemed proved in the absence of proof to the contrary.

4. The Seventh Schedule to the principal Act is amended by adding after the word "*Gazette*" therein the words "or newspaper circulating in the locality".

5. Section 3 of the Impounding Act Amendment Act, 1923, and section 4 of the Impounding Act Amendment Act, 1925, are hereby repealed.
