An Act to provide for the Leasing of the North Parade, at Port Adelaide.

[Assented to, 11th January, 1867.]

WHEREAS it is desirable to enable the Governor to Lease the North Parade—Be it therefore Enacted, by the Governor-in-Chief of the Province of South Australia, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and House of Assembly of the said Province, in this present Parliament assembled, as follows: Preamble.

1. It shall be lawful for the Governor, in the name and on behalf of Her Majesty, from time to time, to demise for any term not exceeding twenty-one years, in possession, any portion of the public reserve at Port Adelaide, known as the North Parade, and all leases to be made under the power herein contained, shall be of such portion or portions of the said public reserve, for such term not exceeding the term of twenty-one years as aforesaid, at such rent, to such person or persons, and generally upon such terms, covenants, and conditions as the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, may determine: Provided that such leases shall be granted only to the person who shall be declared the purchaser of the same at public auction, and of the time and place of such auction, not less than one, nor more than six calendar months notice shall have been given in the *Government Gazette*.

Power for Governor to grant leases of North Parade.

2. The rents to be received under any such lease shall be paid to the Treasurer, and be by him carried to a separate account and expended

pended upon such works as may from time to time be necessary or expedient for the deepening and general improvement of the Port of Adelaide.
