An Act to establish a Standard of Time in South Australia.

[Assented to, December 21st, 1894.]

BE it Enacted by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and House of Assembly of South Australia, in this present Parliament assembled, as follows: Preamble.

1. This Act may be cited as the "Standard Time Act, 1894." Short title.

2. This Act shall come into operation on a day to be appointed by the Governor, by Proclamation published in the *Government Gazette*. Commencement of Act.

3. The mean time of the one hundred and thirty-fifth meridian of longitude east of Greenwich shall be deemed, and is hereby declared to be, standard time throughout South Australia. The time of the one hundred and thirty-fifth meridian to be standard time.

4. Whenever any expression of time occurs in any Act, Order in Council, rule, regulation, or by-law, or deed, or in any instrument whatsoever, and whenever the doing or not doing anything at a certain time of day or night, or during a certain part of the day or the night, has an effect in law, such time shall, unless it is otherwise specifically stated, be held to be standard time throughout South Australia, as declared by this Act. The time mentioned in Acts, rules, or instruments to mean standard time.

In the name and on behalf of Her Majesty, I hereby assent to this Bill.
